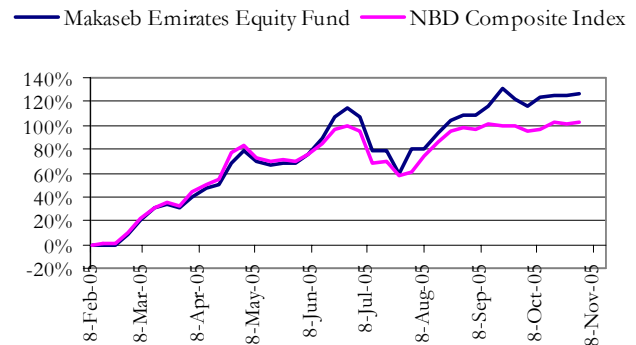
### Overview and Outlook

The UAE markets witnessed little activity during October on account of lower liquidity albeit corporate earnings for the 9-month period have been impressive. The markets generally remained flat with National Bank of Dubai Composite Index ("NBD CI") inching up by 1bps during the month. Most of the activity was witnessed in small capitalization stocks while large capitalization stocks remained relatively inactive. Etisalat continued to depress the market following investors' reaction to the negative news about its awaited deal to acquire 26% of Pakistan Telecommunication Company ("PTCL"). On October 30, it was officially announced by the Government of Pakistan that Etisalat has backed away from its bid to acquire PTCL; this is expected to reduce uncertainty surrounding the stock price. In the aftermath of this event, we expect the company will continue seeking growth opportunities in the region.

Makaseb Emirates Equity Fund ("MEEF") largely tracked the market and added 25 bps during the month bringing its year to date return to 132.11%. The fund generally benefited from Dubai Islamic Bank ("DISB"), MEEF's third largest position, which fared relatively well and the stock price moved up by 6.46% during the month mainly on account of strong 9 months profits resulting in robust earnings growth of 106% over the corresponding period last year. DISB has been expanding its branch operations rapidly and increasing its presences by opening representative offices in the region. On the other hand, Emaar failed to impress the market by its robust 9 months profitability posting a 255% earnings growth over the corresponding period last year. Its stock price during the month declined by 0.74%

Going forward, we expect net inflow of funds into the equity market following Eid-ul-Fitar holidays. Also funds that had earlier flowed into DanaGas IPO will return to the market. This is expected to increase activity going forward. Further, current valuations can be more justified in light of October's corporate earnings announcements and this fact would strengthen investors' confidence in the market.
